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2	(The hearing commenced at 10:04 a.m.)
3	MR. OLCOTT: All right, everybody, I'm
4	going to call this hearing to order regarding the
5	C.O.N. expansion for Fort Ann E.M.S. Ms. Lee Burns,
6	she's going to be the Hearing Officer for today's
7	activities. Whenever you're ready, ma'am.
8	THE HEARING OFFICER: So, good
9	morning. This is a public hearing for the Fort Ann
10	application for determination of public need for
11	expanding operating authority for the ambulance
12	services required by article 30 of the New York State
13	Public Health law. I forgot to ask, are you ready?
14	COURT REPORTER: Can you pull that a
15	little closer?
16	THE HEARING OFFICER: The purpose of
17	today's hearing is to provide a technical review and
18	objective evaluation of the applicant's statement of
19	deed, as well as hear testimony. During the hearing,
20	the committee of the REMSCO may hear witnesses,
21	receive written statements, ask questions, accept
22	testimony in any form that will lend creditability to
23	the hearing and the REMSCO determination.
24	Article 30, section three thousand
25	three, sub five of Public Health Law states the

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2	REMSCO shall have their responsibility to make a
3	determination of need for the establishment of
4	additional emergency medical services and ambulance
5	services and to make determinations of public need as
6	provided in section three thousand eight.
7	The New York State E.M.S. Council and
8	the Department of Health have defined public need as
9	the demonstrated absence, reduced availability, or an
10	inadequate level of care and ambulance or an
11	emergency medical service available to a geographic
12	area which is not readily correctable through the
13	reallocation or improvement of existing resources.
14	It should be noted that in accordance
15	with policy statement O six O six, the application
16	bears the burden of proof for the determination of
17	public need. It is the intent of the public
18	application and hearing process to obtain input from
19	all who may use, provide, pay for or participate in
20	the E.M.S. system.
21	Does anyone have any questions? With
22	that I would say that actually so are you are
23	representing the applicant? Can
24	MR. MCPHERSON: The two of us are,
25	yes.

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2	THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay. I go
3	ahead.
4	MR. MCPHERSON: You want to say
5	anything first?
6	MS. LADD: No, go ahead.
7	MR. MCPHERSON: Oh, I got a pile of
8	notes here.
9	THE HEARING OFFICER: There you go.
10	MR. MCPHERSON: Okay. You want me to
11	state my name for the recording?
12	THE HEARING OFFICER: Yes, please.
13	MR. MCPHERSON: My name's Robert
14	McPherson. I'm a volunteer paramedic with Fort Ann
15	Rescue Squad. I also sit on the Board of Directors
16	alongside Regina Ladd, the President of the Board of
17	Directors.
18	First, we want to thank everybody for
19	coming to the hearing today. The the Board of
20	Directors at Fort Ann wants the healthy discussion to
21	explore all the the nuances of this this
22	this issue, and we're happy to have that
23	conversation.
24	Fort Ann believes that the need for
25	the the Glens Falls Hospital and the greater

Page 6 9/2/2025 - Fort Ann Rescue Squad - Lake George, NY 1 community as a whole necessitates more involved 3 parties in the service of transportation of the sick 4 and injured from one hospital to another. Our track record for the last two years as -- as we can show 6 and we've submitted the documentation to support 7 that, that there's plenty of room in this -- in this 8 community for more than one provider. Just -- just 9 our sheer call volume numbers speak to that. 10 Our -- our business model was born out 11 of necessity for Glens Falls to serve the community. It wasn't by any intentional design. But the -- the 12 13 -- the need existed and we fulfilled it and we have 14 been for the last year and a half. We've added resources, we've added manpower, we've added 15 16 vehicles, we've added shifts to accommodate that. 17 In addition to that, our community at Fort Ann has also benefited from the added staffing 18 19 ability, the added vehicles and resources, the 20 training experience gained through the increased call volume. We -- we haven't yet found a -- a -- a 21 22 detriment to our community whatsoever. In the last four years, we haven't 23 dropped the first call in the district. In the last 24 25 two years, we've only dropped two. They were second

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2	and third calls.
3	MS. LADD: Fourth and fifth.
4	MR. MCPHERSON: Fourth and fifth calls
5	as a matter of fact. For a town of our size, that's
6	that's practically unheard of being able to do
7	that while also supporting the the Glens Falls
8	Hospital and their transportation needs.
9	So far to date, we we've assisted
10	with doing approximately twelve hundred transfers out
11	of Glens Falls Hospital, in addition to Warrensburg
12	doing around five hundred, Moreau doing about four
13	hundred. This totaling for 2025, that's about
14	twenty-one hundred patients that the primary C.O.N.
15	holders weren't able to facilitate. And it's not for
16	us to decide whether they can or cannot, but they
17	have not. That's that's the fact. And we've been
18	able to help offset that.
19	We also do want to as Fort Ann, we
20	would love to endorse any other applicant that wants
21	to file for expansion to help serve the Glens Falls
22	Hospital. The faster patients move out of Glens
23	Falls Hospital to where they need to be, the faster
24	our emergency nine one one patients get through the
25	door and get a bed inside. So we're this isn't a

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2	one man show here, one agency show. We're we're
3	happy to have all the help we can we can give. We
4	can't do it on our own, Ambulzn can't do it on their
5	own, Glens Falls Fire Department can't do it on their
6	own.
7	Twenty-one hundred calls a year just
8	from the us three, nobody can do that on their
9	own. We just want to be doing it correctly. I think
10	that's the end of speech.
11	THE HEARING OFFICER: Tell me your
12	name again.
13	MR. MCPHERSON: Bob. Common spelling
14	B-O-B.
15	THE HEARING OFFICER: Thanks.
16	MR. MCPHERSON: You are welcome.
17	THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Anyone
18	else wish to speak in favor of the application?
19	MR. WILLIAMS: Yeah, I can. Do I need
20	to step up the mic?
21	THE HEARING OFFICER: Yes, and please
22	sign in.
23	MR. WILLIAMS: Okay.
24	THE HEARING OFFICER: So legibly
25	preferably.

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2	MR. WILLIAMS: Anybody got a pen?
3	COURT REPORTER: If he can state his
4	name Ms. Burns?
5	THE HEARING OFFICER: Yeah, state your
6	name.
7	MR. WILLIAMS: Came unprepared for
8	signing anything. All right. My name's Thomas
9	Williams. I am a Glens Falls E.R. Doctor and Medical
10	Director for local regional agencies.
11	And yeah, I'm I'm here just to
12	support the application as well. You know, as a E.R.
13	doctor, I function in this hospital and we
14	desperately rely on all of our local agencies for
15	services to transport out of the hospital. We're a
16	high-volume hospital, and we serve a critical patient
17	population that needs access to Albany Medical
18	Center, and we have no other way to do it other than
19	relying on our regional partners.
20	You know, we do have a contract right
21	now with Ambulnz and they do transport a percentage
22	of our patients, but we have to rely on our other
23	regional partners to do that. There's many agencies
24	in this area that contribute to that transport need.
25	Right now, Fort Ann has taken the

Page 10 9/2/2025 - Fort Ann Rescue Squad - Lake George, NY 1 initiative to build a dedicated program. 3 they've done a really good job of building out a 4 independent resource separate from their primary nine one one response to serve the transport needs of the 6 hospital. They've done a great job of staffing it, 7 and they do an excellent job in responding promptly 8 to our requests. 9 Without Fort Ann and without our other 10 regional partners, the E.R. would cease to function 11 because we would get critically overwhelmed with patients very quickly if we can't transport out. 12 And 13 relying on one single agency in this area for 14 transports is not feasible because no matter how well-staffed they are, there's no real way to 15 16 transport every patient in the timely manner that we 17 need and that the patients need to service them adequately. 18 19 So, while I think Ambulnz does a good 20 job in transporting the patients that they do transport, they can't fulfill all our needs and we 21 22 need our other regional agencies to help us with If this is a step in that process, I fully 23 24 support it. 25 THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.

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2	MR. WILLIAMS: Thanks.
3	THE HEARING OFFICER: Is there anyone
4	else who wishes to speak in favor of the application?
5	MR. SEXTON: I'll speak. Mine is not
6	necessarily in favor, I'm just going to come in as a
7	neutral party. I do a little I'm going to take
8	off my hat. I apologize. I wear a hat all the time
9	in the summer so the top of my head is white.
10	THE HEARING OFFICER: Please say your
11	name.
12	MR. SEXTON: Sure. It'd going to be
13	Michael Sexton, Town of Fort Ann Deputy Supervisor.
14	All right. Good morning, Board. My name is Michael
15	Sexton, I'm the Deputy Town Supervisor for the Town
16	of Fort Ann.
17	I'll start by first mentioning that
18	our town is very lucky to be served by such a
19	dedicated and professional E.M.S. service. As a
20	former member of the rescue the Fort Ann Rescue
21	Squad, I know firsthand the challenges associated
22	with running a full-time E.M.S. agency. As a Town
23	Councilman, I also understand firsthand the
24	challenges faced by communities in funding their
25	local emergency services.

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2	In a field with ever-rising
3	operational costs and dwindling manpower, it becomes
4	critical for E.M.S. agencies to explore ways to
5	supplement additional revenue. While Fort Ann E.M.S.
6	seems to have found an avenue which provides them
7	with supplemental income, it does come with a does
8	come with a degree of concern, especially for our
9	local municipality.
10	Fort Ann has done a great job of
11	increasing their assets to meet the demands of their
12	transport service. However, if at the end of the day
13	this venture does not work out, how does it affect
14	our community? That is our main focus as a Town
15	Board in Fort Ann.
16	Transport E.M.S. has an incredibly
17	high incidence of employee turnover. I can speak to
18	this, I worked for Empire for ten years. Employees
19	often find themselves burnt out in just a few short
20	years. The vehicles used for transports often tend
21	to have a shorter life expectancy and require a
22	higher degree of maintenance than those used
23	specifically for emergency responses in just the
24	local jurisdiction. If at the end of this, it is
25	unsuccessful and not the profitable long-term venture

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9/2/2025 - Fort Ann Rescue Squad - Lake George, NY it was portrayed to be, the question becomes what happens. Is it a -- is a fear amongst those in our community that Fort Ann would be forced to liquidate assets and begin to lay off employees.

There's no doubt that that scenario has an impact to our local E.M.S. responses in the Town and Village of Fort Ann. But we acknowledge that we are in no position to tell Fort Ann E.M.S. how to operate, we do feel slight -- we do feel a little slighted that there has been very little to almost no communication between the town and Fort Ann E.M.S. when it comes to this expansion. You may notice that other municipalities in Washington County were sent certified letters of intent. However, the Town of Fort Ann, the local government body, was not sent the same certified letter, nor was the Village of Fort Ann. I do hope this was an oversight and not one by design.

It is our belief at the Town of Fort
Ann that Fort Ann E.M.S. could have been more
forthcoming and informative with their intentions.
That's would have allowed us to do our diligence and
allowed our constituents in the Town of Fort Ann to
ask questions and voice their concerns. We ask that

Page 14 9/2/2025 - Fort Ann Rescue Squad - Lake George, NY 1 before moving forward with granting this expansion, 3 you take the time to consider the potential negative 4 impacts this may have on our local municipality, which is served by Fort Ann E.M.S. 6 I'm a staunch supporter of Fort Ann 7 E.M.S. I love and appreciate every member and 8 employee they have. I find their service and 9 dedication unwavering. I just ask this Board and the 10 governing board of Fort Ann E.M.S. to ensure that 11 every I is dotted and every T is crossed. We must ensure that this new potential venture doesn't 12 13 interfere in any way with the service we provide to 14 our taxpayers in the town. Thank you. 15 THE HEARING OFFICER: Is there anyone 16 else who wishes to speak in favor of the application? 17 I'll ask two more times and then -- is there anyone else who wishes to speak in favor? Anyone else who 18 19 wishes to speak in favor of the application? 20 no one jumping forward to speak I will ask, is there anyone who wishes to speak in opposition of the 21 22 Is there anyone who wishes to speak in application? 23 opposition of the application? MR. MODERT: Good morning. I'll hand 24 25 a copy of what I'm getting ready to talk about here.

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2	THE HEARING OFFICER: Oh, you make my
3	life so much better.
4	MR. MODERT: I'll keep it simple as I
5	know that other agencies will want to say something
6	as well. So, I'll try not to steal their thunder in
7	the process.
8	My name is Issachar Modert, I'm with
9	the City of Glens Falls Fire Department, Deputy
10	Chief. As you may or may not know, City of Glens
11	Falls is one of the entities that does hold the
12	C.O.N. for the City of Glens Falls, which also
13	entails the hospital.
14	So with that being said, I would like
15	to make this official. On behalf of the City of
16	Glens Falls Fire Department ambulance, we
17	respectfully submit this letter in opposition to the
18	pending certificate of need application for a new
19	ambulance service intended to provide transport
20	services exclusively for the hospital discharges
21	within our district.
22	One, existing coverage is sufficient.
23	Currently, there are three E.M.S. agencies, or soon
24	to be, including the City of Glens Falls Fire
25	Department ambulance hold valid C.O.N.s within this

Collectively, these agencies provide comprehensive emergency and non-emergency transports to the entire community. There's no evidence of any unmet need or lack of service capacity that would justify the issuance of an additional C.O.N. The public's emergency medical needs are being adequately addressed under the existing system.

Two, hospital's only service is not community E.M.S. It is not part of the nine one one service. Yes, E.M.S. agencies under Article 30 of New York State Public Health Law exists to provide service to the community at large, not serve the isolated businesses and their interests of a single institution. Granting a C.O.N. for a hospital-only transport service would distort the intended purpose of the statute. Such an arrangement would establish a precedent that undermines the role of E.M.S. as a public safety function supported by and accountable to the entire community.

Three, duplication creates
insufficiency and waste. Introducing an additional
E.M.S. agency for the sole purpose of hospital
transport would unnecessarily provide duplicate
services already being provided. This will fragment

Page 17 9/2/2025 - Fort Ann Rescue Squad - Lake George, NY 1 call volume, reduce operational efficiency, and 3 undermine the financial stability of existing 4 agencies. New York State law requires proof of public need, not institutional convenience as a basis for granting a C.O.N. No such proof has been 6 demonstrated in this case. 7 8 Risk of public safety and taxpayer 9 The City of Glens Falls Fire Department 10 ambulance, like many municipal E.M.S. providers, is 11 supported in part by taxpayer funding to guarantee emergency response readiness. Allowing a hospital-12 13 only ambulance provided -- provider to siphon off 14 profitable transports would weaken the financial 15 foundation of public E.M.S. This could result in 16 higher cause for taxpayers, reduced capacity for 17 emergency response, and ultimately a negative impact on public safety. 18 In conclusion, there is no 19 demonstrated public need for additional C.O.N. within 20 this district. Existing E.M.S. agencies already 21 22 provide comprehensive coverage, and the proposed hospital only service would duplicate services, waste 23 resource and undermine both public safety and the 24 25 financial stability of the current system.

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2	For these reasons, we are respectfully
3	respectfully request the regional E.M.S. Council
4	and the New York State Department of Health to
5	disapprove this application. The City of Glens Falls
6	Fire Department ambulance remains committed to
7	serving the community and collaborating with
8	hospitals and partner agencies to ensure both
9	emergency and non-emergency needs are met within the
10	framework of our existing C.O.N. authority.
11	Respectively respectfully submitted, City of Glens
12	Falls Fire Department.
13	With that letter being submitted to
14	you, I just want to continue a couple other points
15	like we brought out. E.M.S. in itself as a whole in
16	New York State is on the precipice, especially in the
17	North Country, of many agencies not being able to
18	provide the support in a timely manner. The average
19	response times are going up because we are getting
20	busier in the North Country. We don't have the
21	personnel who are adequately trained and certified,
22	because as we know, it's becoming harder and harder
23	to find a local entity to teach and house our E.M.S.
24	program for paramedics.
25	The only thing that we have going for

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9/2/2025 - Fort Ann Rescue Squad - Lake George, NY us is the E.M.T. program has stabilized and -- and has been a huge success in our local area. And thanks to the County to make -- making sure that's happening. But with adding another entity and another source taken away from our providers, it's going to allow that. As you know and they'll speak for themselves very shortly, they are also doing all they can to support the system as a whole, but they are also burdened by the extra weight of a business needing help.

As I said, E.M.S. C.O.N.s are intended to serve the whole community, not just the hospital discharge needs. I think everybody there in this room, including Dr. Williams, Dr. Gurley (phonetic), who is our medical director, also agrees to that endeavor that the hospital is in desperate need of a transport agency that will provide the means.

They've tried for many, many years.

They've reached out to us to give them something and as much as we wanted to our tax base, we cannot do that without creating a separate entity. Does that say in the future that we might be entertaining it?

No. We probably will, because if the mayor says so and if the hospital who runs the show get together

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2	and say we want it, then that's what's going to
3	happen. That's what municipalities do.
4	But at this time, the E.M.S. service,
5	we are obligated to provide the E.M.S. service to
6	those in our community, not to businesses. Who's
7	going to say next year that another agency steps up
8	and starts presenting their transport needs, that
9	they're doing a better job than Fort Ann or Ambulnz
10	or Mohawk who is coming, or Moreau who is here now,
11	or anybody else that has helped the hospital do
12	transports. Are we going to provide them a C.O.N. so
13	they can provide a business plan to them? Well,
14	that's going to be decided. But that's not the
15	intention of Article 30. Community-based E.M.S.
16	Okay.
17	Same thing goes for Hudson Headwaters.
18	Hudson Headwaters also realizes that they are a huge
19	pressure on the community and they pay a fee to some
20	of the agencies that are out there to be there for
21	them, because they realize that they're a extra for
22	the communities.
23	So I'd just like to take these few
24	things, put them in front of you to give you
25	something to think about. And with that, I will

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2	relinquish it to some of the others who want to
3	speak. Thank you.
4	THE HEARING OFFICER: Does someone
5	else want to speak in opposition of the application?
6	MR. OUELLETTE: I only brought one
7	copy, but I'll give it to you guys when I'm done with
8	it if you would like a copy of it. My name is Corey
9	Ouellette, I'm the President and C.E.O. of
10	Warrensburg E.M.S. Thank you for the opportunity to
11	speak here today.
12	On behalf of Warrensburg E.M.S., we
13	are writing to formally oppose the application
14	submitted by Fort A Fort Ann E.M.S. to expand
15	their operating territory. The proposed area has
16	been served by established E.M.S. agencies for many
17	years. As such, this request fails to demonstrate
18	the public need required under New York State
19	Department of Health guidelines, which clearly define
20	need as an absence, reduced availability, or
21	inadequate level of care, otherwise not otherwise
22	correctively or correctable by existing resources.
23	Our agency, along with surrounding
24	E.M surrounding E.M.S. agencies, has consistently
25	maintained reliable coverage for both emergency calls

Patients in this 3 region already benefit from a strong network of 4 agencies that ensure timely response and quality The addition of Fort Ann E.M.S. into this 6 territory would not enhance care. Rather, it would 7 create unnecessary duplication of services and 8 competition for an already limited E.M.S. workforce. 9 Allowing for this expansion without demonstrated need 10 would set a troubling precedent, approving territory 11 requests based on overlap rather than necessity risks, destabilizing the regional E.M.S. system, 12 13 weakens collaborative planning and ultimately threatens the patient care con -- threatens patient 14 care continuity. 15 For these reasons, Warrensburg E.M.S. 16 17 respectfully urges this Council to deny Fort Ann E.M.S.'s E.M.S. certificate of need expansion request 18 19 and preserve the integrity of E.M.S. coverage within 20 our region. I thank you for the attention to this matter and your commitment to upholding the highest 21 22 standards of emergence medical services. In addition to this letter, I will 23 just say that in addition to Fort Ann E.M.S., there's 24 25 been multiple agencies that have stepped forward to

I think Moreau was 3 probably one of the first, if I -- my memory serves 4 me correctly, which it doesn't always, that was there for Glens Falls Hospital, when Empire Ambulance was 6 sold. Following the sale of Empire 8 Ambulance, Ambulnz came in, Moreau was doing a lot of 9 transports, and there was still a demonstrated need 10 just because as Izzy had said, not one company can 11 really support it. And I think Dr. Williams had also said that as well. 12 13 So, Warrensburg also has handled 14 hundreds of transports out of Glens Falls Hospital each year. I don't know how many Moreau has done. 15 16 Fort Ann also has started obviously picking up 17 transports, which has been to a great benefit of the residents, community members and patients at Glens 18 19 Falls Hospital. I do fear that if we start or if the 20 21 precedent is set to establish a C.O.N. for one -- for 22 another agency and -- and I know that Warrensburg has seen a -- a drastically reduction in transports. 23 know -- I know Warrensburg has invested hundreds of 24 25 thousands of dollars in staffing to support

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9/2/2025 - Fort Ann Rescue Squad - Lake George, NY transports out of Glens Falls Hospital, and I would imagine that Moreau has put on additional transports or any other company that would be doing that to dedicate ambulances to the hospital that we would see other agencies be pushed out. And eventually the -- the need to invest in funds and crews to support the hospital would go away.

Like Dr. Williams said, or as he said, I'm not sure who but if -- if -- if a plan doesn't work out, like Empire's plan didn't work out and maybe Ambulnz had a plan when they went in there and that didn't work out, then what's the hospital left doing with. And will we be revisiting this issue in another year or two years when the hospital has put most of their eggs in one basket, other agencies has been dispersed and so they're no longer providing service and now patients are suffering again.

So I just think that is there a need for a collaborative effort? Is there a need for maybe, you know, if Glens Falls Fire starts doing transports or what -- what have you, is there a need for some sort of system to be in place to ensure that patients out of Glens Falls Hospital can be transported to inter-facilities and back home and to

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2	their nursing homes? Yes, I absolutely do think that
3	there is, but I think it would be important for
4	everybody to come together and try to make that
5	happen, so it's sustainable for everybody,
6	specifically Glens Falls Hospital. That's all that I
7	have and I thank you for the opportunity.
8	THE HEARING OFFICER: Is there anyone
9	else who wishes to speak in opposition of the
10	application?
11	MR. BARNEY: Hi, how's it going? My
12	name's Aaron Barney, I'm the Chief Operations Officer
13	with West Glens Falls Emergency Squad. So, West
14	Glens Falls, I believe submitted a a letter to you
15	guys in opposition to the C.O.N. application. I'll
16	just keep it pretty short for the majority of what's
17	in the letter.
18	Just like a lot of my other
19	counterparts, we've also participated in air facility
20	transfers from Glens Falls Hospital. It's obviously
21	a very wide array of a need that's needed for the
22	hospital. I think the C.O.N. application pretty much
23	sets forth that trying to obtain a higher hierarchy
24	of the services that are already being provided
25	there, which I think does not benefit in any form

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2	because just like ourselves, we've done over a
3	hundred and fifty transfers out of the facility as it
4	is already. To say that they're meeting the need, I
5	would contest that because we're also participating
6	in assisting in the need of the facility.
7	Also lastly, I just call into question
8	the professional standards and ethical values of the
9	applicant. As you'll see in our letter that we
10	submitted, they have pens that were produced that
11	state the following, you know, we call, we haul. So
12	I I would like to you know, our agency objects
13	to the C.O.N. application and just calls into
14	question their professional moral values. Thanks.
15	THE HEARING OFFICER: Can you say your
16	last name again for me.
17	MR. BARNEY: Barney.
18	THE HEARING OFFICER: Okay.
19	MR. BARNEY: Like the dinosaur.
20	THE HEARING OFFICER: Good to know.
21	Is there anyone else who wishes to speak in
22	opposition of the application?
23	MR. IRWIN: Good morning. I was
24	waiting for everybody else to pop up here. Good
25	morning. My name is Shane Irwin, I serve as the

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2	Chief of Operations for Queensbury E.M.S. and I'm
3	also the Chair of the Warren County E.M.S. Advisory
4	Board.
5	I want to begin by acknowledging the
6	growing concern regarding Ambulnz transports capacity
7	at Glens Falls Hospital. While I understand the
8	urgency and the desire to expand services, it is
9	critical that we recognize this issue as a part of a
10	broader nationwide crisis, not an isolated challenge
11	unique to our region. Across the country, E.M.S.
12	agencies are grappling with severe staffing
13	shortages, financial constraints, and diminishing
14	billing revenue.
15	This system pressures the effective
16	hospitals and transport crews in every state. And
17	I'd like to point out that lo a lot of these
18	ambulance companies that are doing transports
19	nationwide, they don't even have a C.O.N. So
20	technically, you don't need you know, if if
21	if the if there's a crisis, then they're not going
22	to matter. Okay.
23	In response to these concerns, myself
24	alongside the Chief of Glens Falls Fire Department
25	and Warrensburg E.M.S., we met with the hospital

We presented viable options and engaged in a constructive dialogue 4 with E.C.C. officials. 6 However, despite the positive tone at 7 that the meeting, our proposals were ultimately dismissed without further discussions or alternative 8 9 suggestions by the powers that be. So we have 10 brought other options to the hospital and the higher 11 ups, it says, yeah, okay. No. This brings me to the Fort Ann 12 13 application currently under review. I must 14 respectfully, but firmly state that this application should be considered invalid. It contains inaccurate 15 16 -- inaccurate geographic information, including 17 references to non-existent streets, such as South Avenue and Mohegan Street. Approving a document with 18 19 false data undermines the integrity of our process 20 and sets a dangerous precedent. 21 Furthermore, the proposed expansion 22 would have a direct and negative impact on existing providers, particularly Glens Falls Fire Department. 23 The inclusion of these fictitious streets could 24 25 enable Fort Ann to secure additional transport

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2	contracts with health healthcare facilities
3	locating those areas, thereby disrupting established
4	services, boundaries and provider relationship.
5	Some of these areas are Adirondack
6	Nephrology, Adirondack Health Institute Surgical
7	Specialists, Ortho New York and a couple of private
8	doctor offices located within these territory lines.
9	In regards to mutual aid plan, you don't need a
10	C.O.N. for that. We've called them to help us with
11	mutual aid calls, standbys. So in their paperwork,
12	they said, you know, once they get the C.O.N., they'd
13	be more active with with mutual aid. They are.
14	We have personally in our thing, it says that if
15	we're busy, we put it on standby at the county line.
16	So I don't understand why we need a C.O.N. just to do
17	that.
18	Lastly, Glens Falls Hospital has yet
19	to give Glens Falls Fire an opportunity to present
20	other capabilities or discuss with them other
21	optional transport needs. Until such a meeting
22	occurs and all stakeholders are given a fair chance
23	to contribute, I strongly recommend that any further
24	action of this matter be paused. If they're willing
25	to pay Fort Ann for their services, they sh they

I'd also like to 7 point out too, that I know several years ago we -- I 8 went to Glens Falls Hospital. They were -- they were 9 hurting. I said, hey, listen, I'll put on extra 10 cruise. Please call us and we'll do transports. 11 lost two hundred thousand dollars in staffing because they didn't call us and stuff when we said we'd offer 12 13 it. We put people on. That's a lot of money to lose 14 in an agency. So I think Glens Falls Hospital needs 15 16 to, you know, get in gear and start talking to other 17 agencies like Glens Fall Fire, say, hey, what can -you know, how can we help you guys help us. Like I 18 19 said, if they're going to offer another agency to 20 come in five hundred thousand dollars to do transports, why can't they pay Glens Fall -- Glens 21 22 Falls fire the same, you know? So that's my point, 23 and I think I lost your attendance sheet. No, I 24 stole this. Sorry. There you go. Thank you. 25 THE HEARING OFFICER: Is there anyone

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2	else who wishes to speak in opposition of the
3	application?
4	MR. VANGUILDER: I guess my question
5	will be my name is Steve Vanguilder.
6	COURT REPORTER: I'm sorry. Can you
7	wait till you get to the mic, that way I can get it
8	for the record? Thank you.
9	MR. VANGUILDER: My name is Steve
10	VanGuilder. I'm Executive Director of Moreau
11	Emergency Squad. I just want to confirm that you've
12	received our letter. I I came in late, so I don't
13	know if everybody got it or not.
14	MR. OLCOTT: The REMSCO did receive
15	it, yes.
16	MR. VANGUILDER: Okay. Has it been
17	read?
18	MR. OLCOTT: It has been given to you?
19	THE HEARING OFFICER: I have read it.

21	here read it or they have they had a chance to
22	read it?
23	MR. OLCOTT: I don't believe so.

17	one, I I don't need an ambulance coming from Fort
18	Ann, definitely. Even if it's system status quo back
19	that's my thought on Glens Falls Fire. We're all
20	burdened. We understand. So, whatever we can do,
21	but we oppose the C.O.N. Thanks.
22	THE HEARING OFFICER: Is there anyone
23	else who wishes to speak in opposition of the
24	application? Is there anyone else who wishes to
25	speak in opposition of the application? And is there

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2	anyone else who wishes to speak in opposition of the
3	application? Are there any REMSCO members wishing to
4	speak or ask questions regarding the application or
5	the testimony? Do you all have a pulse?
6	MR. MCPHERSON: The applicant or
7	anyone that spoke?
8	THE HEARING OFFICER: Anyone who
9	spoke.
10	MR. OLCOTT: So, I do have a question.
11	My name's Dakota Olcott. I'm the Vice Chair of the
12	Mountain Lakes REMSCO. My question would be for you,
13	Dr. Williams in regards to Glens Falls Hospital. Do
14	they have like a transfer center that determines who
15	does the transports or is it kind of like a free
16	will, whoever's available?
17	MR. WILLIAMS: No. The desk clerks
18	have lists of everybody who is available for
19	transports or is offered to transport and they
20	basically just go down the list and call whoever
21	responds first.
22	MR. OLCOTT: Okay.
23	MR. WILLIAMS: One of the things we
24	have run into is that, some agencies will transport,
25	but they will transport the patients who reside in

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2	their district and not transport patients who don't
3	reside in their district.
4	So, for instance, if someone from the
5	North Country gets hurt and they don't reside within
6	the territory of a given agency, they were less
7	likely to transport them. But if the patient does
8	live in with their transport agency district, they
9	will transport them. So, one of the obstacles we
10	have to overcome is sometimes that's an issue.
11	MR. OLCOTT: Okay. Is there anyone
12	from Ambulnz here? Okay. My only other question was
13	for them.
14	THE HEARING OFFICER: Anyone else from
15	the REMSCO?
16	MR. OUELLETTE: I would I
17	apologize. In reference to the list, I didn't know
18	how the list was
19	THE HEARING OFFICER: I'm sorry I'm
20	sorry you're a little farther away from the mic than
21	Mr. Williams.
22	MR. OUELLETTE: In in reference to
23	the list that Dr. Williams referenced, I didn't know
24	how the list of how agencies were contacted was is
25	comprised.

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2	MR. WILLIAMS: Me too. I don't know.
3	MR. IRWIN: Can I add to that? Can
4	you hear me over there? Is it okay? You can hear
5	me?
6	COURT REPORTER: Yes.
7	MR. IRWIN: Okay, good. So we were
8	told from the hospital that if a call patient care
9	have originated in your district or end your
10	district, they will call that agency. They have not
11	called like us, where numerous times I hear with the
12	radio of Washington County agencies bringing somebody
13	back to a nursing home that's in our district, which
14	we told them we will do.
15	So this whole list, like I say, it
16	goes back it falls back into Glens Falls Hospital.
17	They got to do something because we were told by the
18	officials that, again, if the call originates in your
19	district or it happened, or they go back to your
20	district, they'll call that agency to do the
21	transports and I have not received those type of
22	calls. Let alone I hear with the last you know,
23	that they go back to their district. Again, the
24	Washington County agency is bringing somebody back
25	and when they're available, so.

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2	MR. OLCOTT: Tom, I do have a question
3	for you.
4	MR. NOBLE: Yes.
5	MR. OLCOTT: So in regards to
6	transports, are you guys capable with this plan of
7	providing B.L.S, A.L.S. and C.T. transport?
8	MR. NOBLE: Yes.
9	MR. OLCOTT: Okay.
10	MR. NOBLE: We we have been already
11	doing it for two years consistently. Yeah. I was
12	going to say, I I I don't have the number in
13	front of me. I do apologize
14	MR. TIMS: It was submitted. All the
15	documentation was submitted for.
16	MR. NOBLE: I think we've done almost
17	thirteen hundred inter-facilities this year. We did
18	about eighteen hundred last year. I don't remember
19	how many for 2023.
20	COURT REPORTER: Sorry, can you tell
21	me your name?
22	MR. NOBLE: Thomas Noble, Chief of
23	Fort Ann Rescue Squad.
24	COURT REPORTER: Noble?
25	MR. NOBLE: Noble, N-O-B-L-E.

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2	COURT REPORTER: Thank you.
3	MR. WILLIAMS: I guess speakers of
4	REMSCO I'll be - I've got a booming voice.
5	MR. TIMS: Excuse me, one second.
6	THE HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.
7	MR. TIMS: All right. My name is
8	Johnsons, everybody knows me as Jack. I just have a
9	couple clarification questions as opposed in in
10	regard to, excuse me, the the narrative section of
11	the application.
12	One was mentioned about the roads were
13	not mentioned written correctly, that's okay, could
14	be just a typo thing that's up to you guys. Under
15	the section one second. Excuse me. In the
16	narrative under the section one impact upon existing
17	ambulance and or emergency medical services proposed
18	area, and I just have this up here that my printer
19	wasn't working this morning. Under mutual aid, it
20	says we will participate in the mutual aid system in
21	Fort Ann County, but then as you scroll down and
22	this may be my ignorance, that's why I'm just asking
23	clarification questions. I'm a little stupid
24	sometimes.
25	Under the section two, E.M.S. system

MR. NOBLE: So, our attorney obviously 12 13 wrote this. I'm not smart enough to have written it. 14 MR. TIMS: Neither am I. So, I'm asking questions. 15 So I asked him the same 16 MR. NOBLE: 17 question. So we obviously participate in the Warren County mutual aid program as Chief Irwin had stated, 18 19 as we're required to. So he said we were required to 20 put that in there per, you know, as part of our application. And I believe he put the second portion 21 22 because with what we're doing in Glens Falls, the intent is not to take nine one one calls within that 23 -- that expansion of territory. We don't -- we have 24 25 no desire to take nine one one calls in Glens Falls

5	that's why it was was written in there. I'm not a
6	lawyer, so
7	MR. TIMS: Right.
8	MR. NOBLE: I'm not
9	MR. TIMS: If that would need some
10	clarification or rewriting, I'm not sure how that
11	process will go. So again, excuse my ignorance, and
12	then what I'm not going to search for any here,
13	but I did read into it. It did mention about
14	obviously in the application, you list the ambulances
15	that you have, the personnel, all that little fun
16	stuff and which is perfectly fine. But then it
17	did mention somewhere in here, again, I could dig for
18	it in a few minutes. It did mention that you'll
19	you have four ambulances, I believe.
20	MR. NOBLE: We have five now.
21	MR. TIMS: Five. And it said well,
22	I believe it said in here, four ambulances will be
23	available for transports. So if it's one of those
24	days where Dr. Williams got has to get everybody
25	out or the doctors have to get everybody out of that

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2	that E.R., and you're putting four ambulances
3	there, what's happening to the Town of Fort Ann?
4	What's happening to nine one responses?
5	MR. MCPHERSON: So so our our
6	default staffing prior to to transport the
7	transport business was one ambulance twenty-four
8	hours a day. That's our contract with the Town of
9	Fort Ann. One paramedic level ambulance twenty-four
10	hours a day. We're willing to dedicate the four
11	additional ambulances that the transport business has
12	supplemented us with to do those transports, but we
13	never stripped the the district of that that
14	duty ring.
15	That that's always covered. That
16	is our primary objective. That's that's the
17	reason for our existence is the Town of Fort Ann. So
18	we give them exactly the same service that we're
19	contracted with and that the that the Town Town
20	needs. It's the in between times when we have the
21	four crews on that the town benefits from all that
22	downtime, we have four extra crews and we can send
23	several. But we never strip the primary da duty
24	ring out of the district.
25	MR. TIMS: Okay. Are and again,

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2	could be my mistake. Do you have all four excuse
3	me, all five ambulances listed in this application,
4	or do you only have the four?
5	MR. NOBLE: We only put four because
6	our town contract states we have to we have to
7	keep one ambulance in our district at all times.
8	MR. TIMS: Okay. Because that to me
9	is a little misleading. Because the way I'm looking
10	at it from my point of view as a REMSCO board member
11	here is that you have four ambulances there with all
12	these personnel and you have four dedicated to the
13	transports. That's what's making me a little
14	trying to get de-muddy to water, if that's the truth
15	if that's a true word, if you know where I'm going
16	with it.
17	MR. NOBLE: I I I
18	understand what you're saying.
19	MR. TIMS: I could be big, very big
20	with, you know, formality, make sure everything is
21	legitimate.
22	MR. MCPHERSON: What level of care are
23	those rigs?
24	MR. NOBLE: Depends on the day. We
25	used to have well used to. I staff one of those

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2	ambulances Monday through Friday. And then we have
3	another paramedic in the building that's available if
4	needed. Our other person that's usually staffing one
5	of the other ambulances hopefully is delivering a
6	baby in the next sixteen hours, so she's out. So
7	we're going to see a little bit of a delay over the
8	next two weeks, but then we're back to three
9	paramedics during the daytime.
10	MR. TIMS: And you'll be with her, I
11	hope.
12	MR. NOBLE: I'm I'm hoping so.
13	Still got the bracelet. So, I hope that's
14	MR. TIMS: For your safety I think you
15	should.
16	MR. NOBLE: Well, and and I
17	understand where you're where where you're
18	going with this. I did ask our attorney a lot of
19	questions in that's pretty much told me that it had
20	to be in there that way and he wrote it.
21	MR. TIMS: All right. To me, it's a
22	little misleading. Okay. Thank you.
23	THE HEARING OFFICER: Mark.

10	now. I'm I'm I can be booming. Mark Spiezio
11	deputy E.M.S. coordinator in Washington County and
12	REMSCO member. These questions may be directed
13	towards the Hearing Officer. These are legal
14	questions, but I think for clarification we would
15	like to I would I know I would like to see
16	them.
17	In Article 30 and in 0606, it mentions
18	and the reason I ask is I've been through two or
19	three hearings on both sides regarding C.O.N. It
20	refers to existing resources and the reallocation of
21	existing resources to meet the public need. For
22	clarification purposes, does that only include
23	current C.O.N. holders or does that include any other
24	resource that is providing service in that territory?
25	And it it probably goes to the

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2	second part of the question. And again, this being
3	all more of a inner facility situation rather than a
4	nine one one situation, but the terms routine and
5	predictable versus mutual aid as defined in, you
6	know, state regulation mutual aid is not routine and
7	predictable. Once it becomes routine and
8	predictable, it's no longer mutual aid.
9	And the impact of the infamous 20
10	February, 2010 letter from New York State Medicaid
11	that specifically stated that operating outside of an
12	operating territory puts with that is routine
13	and predictable, puts agencies at risk for reduced
14	Medicaid funding or not getting Medicaid funding for
15	certain things.
16	So if there's any way we could clarify
17	the status of those questions that I think would be
18	beneficial I know for for me, in the final
19	decision-making process and perhaps for other Council
20	members.
21	THE HEARING OFFICER: I was afraid you
22	were going to do that.
23	MR. NOBLE: We're going to do it
24	anyway.
25	THE HEARING OFFICER: I know. So,

And E.M.S. and all 9 10 -- all of the systems were totally different in 1992. 11 So, the most recent version with some minor changes, that's how old it is. And 3010 has not changed. 12 13 3010 is -- is quite frankly, in our modern E.M.S. and 14 I don't use that mo -- modern term saying that we've come so far, you know, but in our modern E.M.S. 15 16 system, 3010 is really difficult to comply with. 17 So Dr. Williams talked about bringing patients back to their home territories. So 3010 18 19 quite specifically says that volunteer E.M.S. 20 organizations may bring their ambit -- their -- their residents to and from the hospital back to their 21 22 territory or may bring a resident of their community to a referral center or trauma center or a resource 23 center. Whatever term they used in 1992. 24 25 So to be perfectly honest with every

You have a couple of 4 volunteers interspersed with your career people. the next section in 3010 speaks to commercial 6 ambulance services, of which you -- most of you are 7 not that. 3010 doesn't recognize municipalities 8 pretty much at all because the municipality section 9 came later. 10 But what it says about commercial 11 services is that they must hold operating territory where at least on one end of their operating 12 13 certificate. So for example, at -- you know, Ambulnz 14 can pick up a patient at Glens Falls Hospital and may transfer them to Strong Memorial Hospital in 15 16 Rochester. They don't hold territory in Rochester. 17 With all due respect to all of you, with the exception, honestly, of the three ambulance 18 19 services that hold operating territory in the City of 20 Glens Falls, none of you are doing this in compliance with Article 30. Not a one of you. And I say this 21 22 because I -- I ride on an ambulance not far from here and listen to the ambulance calls coming in and out 23 of Glens Falls Hospital and taking patients to 24 25 facilities outside of their operating territory.

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2	It's in violation of Article 30 and
3	you know, again, that's problematic because that's
4	what Article 30 says. Is that right? Is that
5	morally fair? No. And the reason for that is that
6	Glens Falls Hospital and every single hospital
7	everywhere can't take care of the patients they have.
8	They need desperately to get patients out.
9	One of the things that struck me when
10	Bob was speaking was that it is not he stated it
11	is not Fort Ann's intention to do this in the absence
12	of everybody else. I will say that it is interesting
13	that Fort Ann has applied for operating certificate
14	that includes Glens Falls Hospital because that would
15	make their transfers out of there legal, which makes
16	competition really technically difficult.
17	That said, you know and this is a
18	question to you so that for the benefit of the REMSCO
19	members, you know, in your I know in your opinion,
20	Fort Ann has the excess capacity to answer this need.
21	But in your comments, you said not by yourself.
22	MR. NOBLE: Absolutely. We I'm
23	sorry. So we we I mean, we can only do so much
24	per day. We receive somewhere between ten and twenty
25	phone calls from the hospital a day. And we can only

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2	take so many patients per day. We turn down probably
3	fifty percent of what we get called for, not because
4	we're not available because the ambulance isn't
5	staffed, it's because they're they're already out
6	there.
7	So that's why I stated before, as Bob
8	did that, we can't do it alone. There's there's
9	still a need and that's why our stance still stays
10	that if if somebody else wanted to file for a
11	C.O.N. we would support it because we want to do this
12	legally.
13	We didn't know until six months ago we
14	were required to have a C.O.N., until I read 3010 and
15	was like, okay, there's we have a problem because
16	we are we are routine. We we're no longer
17	mutually late. We are routine. So therefore, if we
18	were to stop today, because New York State could come
19	in at any minute and say stop. And it would impact
20	the Glens Falls Hospital in such a negative way.
21	West Glens Falls is they're the busiest agency in,
22	in Warren County. They can't do the the the
23	amount that we do.
24	MR. MCPHERSON: Not overnight.
25	MR. NOBLE: Correct. So, we we

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2	understand that there's a need for for multiple
3	C.O.N.s. We just want to do this legally so that the
4	so that the state can't come in and say stop and
5	per like our our town board member said, could
6	devastate our own town.

9	support of Fort Ann and their application. Dr.

Article 30 doesn't really allow 4 for that. 6 What -- what you do need to be 7 concerned about and every single one of you doing 8 these transport need to be concerned about is that in 9 cons -- concept and in reality Medicare, particularly 10 C.M.S., can come in here and stop paying you and then 11 hold you responsible for every single dollar that you have recouped doing these calls without actual 12 13 operating authority by your governing body, which is 14 the state of New York. 15 In my ten years prior to my 16 retirement, we lost an ambulance service who was 17 fined a small portion actually of what they owed back to C.M.S., but it buried them, and they no longer 18 19 exist. And -- and I honestly cannot imagine our --20 our -- the E.M.S. system locally or in the state cannot afford to lose a single one of you. And most 21 22 importantly, or the patients need you and the 23 hospitals need you. And I would say Dr. Williams, that -- and you know, to a great extent, shame on 24 25 Glens Falls Hospital for not offering options for the

9	wall time. I have stood in Saratoga for an hour and
10	a half waiting to offload a patient. It is very
11	unpleasant for patients, and me because I'm old.
12	But I I Article 30 is
13	problematic for you, REMSCO people. And
14	unfortunately, it's it's problematic for all of

16	Mark Spiezio. That is on the record.
17	MR. SPIEZIO: Redact, redact.
18	THE HEARING OFFICER: I'll get him
19	later.
20	MR. OLCOTT: Dr. Williams, are you
21	aware of any contracts that Glens Falls Hospital has
22	with any commercial service? That's why I was hoping
23	to ask Ambulnz, but
24	MR. WILLIAMS: Well, I know they have
25	a contract with Ambulnz. I can't speak to the

The law doesn't specify that. Sorry, Tom, I 7 was just --MR. NOBLE: I -- I was just asking if 9 I could try to rebut something quickly to make sure 10 it's on the record. So, we have actually been doing inter-facilities probably for about four years. The 11 first year, very intermittent, you know, we didn't 12 13 have a whole lot of resources. Second year, same 14 thing, not a whole lot of resources, Empire was around and -- you know, and they were on their way 15 16 out and Ambulnz was on their way in. 17 In roughly four years, we have done, I'd probably have to say, over twenty-five hundred 18 19 nine one one calls out of our district. And we've 20 dropped eight calls. Eight out of twenty-five 21 hundred in our district. We've dropped zero calls 22 this year. 23 And I just want this on the record because unfortunately I've seen a few people come up 24 25 and say that it's going to decrease response times.

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It's going to make it so that we can't handle our
calls. Our average response time this year is one
point seven minutes from time of dispatch to when we
get an ambulance off the floor responding. And on
top of that, we've been able to help, I want to say
roughly about five hundred patients outside of our
primary territory for mutual aid because we had the
additional staffing.

We are surrounded by a few agencies that unfortunately do not have the available resources to staff every single day. And because of that, patients are getting an ambulance. So this whole thing has been beneficial not just to our organization, but to our county as a whole. We just want to do this legally and we want people to understand there's no detriment to our nine one one service. Our nine one one service, in my opinion, is phenomenal. And it's -- it's made phenomenal by the people below me that continue to run it every day. Thank you.

THE HEARING OFFICER: Is anyone from the REMSCO that we missed wish to make comments, ask questions? Would the applicant like to make some closing remarks?

We've been judicious in need.

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9/2/2025 - Fort Ann Rescue Squad - Lake George, NY our decision to flex the size of the company with perspective of our call volume by currently buying used ambulances because they're cheaper, more cost effective because we know the rug can be pulled out at any point.

Up until today's decision, we haven't -- we don't know what the future is. We're looking for a C.O.N. to affirm the fact that our business model is working, is beneficial to the community, is beneficial to Fort Ann, Warren County, the hospital because we're moving patients from the hospital to where they need to go to -- to increase throughput. The patient is the ultimate person.

The -- the -- the chief from Glens

Falls, he -- he made a myriad of points. I couldn't

write them down quite fast enough. But there seemed

to be a lot of liberty taken with the interpretation

of Article 30. Lee Burns did a nice job bringing

that into -- it's pretty clear. We're here to read

the -- the rule of law and not interpret it. All we

know is in order to continue to do transports, we

need some C.O.N. Again, Warrensburg, if you want to

get a C.O.N. you have our vote. West Glens falls,

unless the hospital's not in here. Right?
